A husband's and wife's covenant needs, are created by God, they are lasting and legitimate needs, for which they have no morale outlet outside of marriage.

A Shared Commitment To The Word Of God

The Husband As Spiritual Leader:

In I Corinthians 14: 34 & 35, an important clause is given in the marriage covenant in terms of the wife's dependence upon her husband for spiritual guidance and the husband's responsibility to go deep in the Word of God, "... *if they desire to learn anything, let them ask their own husbands at home....*" How does this passage speak to the husband's responsibility in the area of the spiritual leadership of the home?

The husband then should bring with him a commitment to the Word of God which allows him to assume his position as the spiritual leader of the family.

A Shared Commitment To The Discipline Of Prayer

One of the amazing things I experience in the ministry is that a couple will come to me with deep personal, marital and family problems, yet they have not set aside the time for regular personal time alone in prayer nor family prayer time. How a family expects to survive apart from a vibrant prayer life remains a constant amazement, yet it is so. One of the covenants you swore to when you married was to bring to your marriage a vibrant prayer life. Not just when your aunt is sick, not just when your husband is out of a job, not just when you become concerned about your parents salvation but a prayer life that extends to every aspect of your faith and walk with God.

The Father And His Children:

It is important for children to grow up with clear memories of their father's prayer life. Children should remember how their father prayed with and for them each evening at bedtime. Children should remember their father praying at meals, not just some prayer said by rote memory, but real conversations with God. Job's children would have memories such as this.

A strong commitment to prayer, begun in the early ears of the marriage, then transcends into the family as children are added. Family devotionals become the norm and a strong family knitted together by prayer grows through the years.

A Shared Commitment To Fellowship

Most couples, when they socialize, think very little about what the Bible has to say when they make their decisions. A company party, old friends, family gatherings, a neighbors invitation, a good opportunity, a shared interest in hobbies, sports or culture – social obligations, good conversation, an enjoyable evening, these are generally the criteria of most couples when they socialize.

For most Christian couples, social engagements seem to pose little or no danger. They view these as personal decisions. As long as it does not involve a drunken orgy, they can handle themselves and come away unscathed. What they do with their free time, with whom they do it, who they choose to socialize with (or without), the activities they engage in, that is their business and no one else's. Sometime this "no one else's" clause even includes their spouse. "I have my friends, he has his" and that is that. You do not criticize or encroach.

You may be surprised to discover that this is not the approach the Bible takes. Those with whom a couple socializes, the husband's friends, the wife's friends, the family members, the parties, the clubs, all these and more play an important role in the spiritual development of the couple and the survival of their marriage.

A Shared Commitment To Evangelism And The Ministry

Aquila and Priscilla are an interesting Biblical couple. Aquila was a Jewish tentmaker who had recently been forced to leave Rome due to religious persecution. Having settled in Corinth he was prosperous enough to take on Paul as a part time worker. From the book of Acts and by gleaning excerpts from Paul's letters, we see them transformed from a couple involved in small business to a couple whose home and life centered around their ministry as a team. By looking at Aquila and Priscilla we can get an idea of how a couple can mature, not only in their relationship with God and the church, but also each other as God molds them together, into a ministry team.

† *Acts 18:1 – 4 After these things he left Athens and went to Corinth. And he found a certain Jew named Aquila, a native of Pontus, having recently come from Italy with his wife Priscilla, because Claudius had commanded all the Jews to leave Rome. He came to them, and because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them and they were working; for by trade they were tent-makers. And he was reasoning in the synagogue every Sabbath and trying to persuade Jews and Greeks.*

† *Acts 18:18 & 19 And Paul, having remained many days longer, took leave of the brethren and put out to sea for Syria, and with him were Priscilla and Aquila. Back in 1976 God called Eleanor and I to move from Austin, Texas to College Station, Texas to minister at Texas A & M university. There was a young couple, Mike and Linda, living and working in Austin who had been involved in our ministry at the University of Texas as college students. They were now graduated, had two small children and the husband was working as an accountant in a successful firm. Realizing that we were beginning a new ministry and would be short handed and cognizant of the fact that he was employable, he resigned his position with the accounting firm in Austin and took a position at a machine shop at much reduced pay as their business manager and accountant. During this time Mike and Linda ministered sacrificially to University students, a number of whom entered the full time ministry as pastors and missionaries. This same heart of availability to the ministry is still manifested. He went on to get his Doctorate and in his position as tenured professor has used his influence to sponsor student works on a number of campuses where he has taught. This summer he will use his vacation time to go to Cameroon with me to teach and minister. I share this to try and help you understand that the heart of Aquila and Priscilla still beats in married couples today. Married couples who want their home to be the center of their ministry and who want to use their vocations and training to be available to serve and minister on the harvest fields of the world.

† *Acts 18:24 – 26 Now a certain Jew named Apollos, an Alexandrian by birth, an eloquent man, came to Ephesus; and he was mighty in the Scriptures. This man had been instructed in the way of the Lord; and being fervent in spirit, he was speaking and teaching accurately the things concerning Jesus, being acquainted only with the baptism of John; and he began to speak out boldly in the synagogue. But when Priscilla and Aquila heard him, they took him aside and explained to him the way of God more accurately.*

Boundaries For Ministering As A Couple

Husbands:

As spiritual leader of the home, certain spiritual responsibilities the husband must fulfill toward his wife and family before he can present himself to the ministry. As a result certain boundaries must naturally be in place for the husband to fulfill this role. Read the following passages and below each record the “boundary” as stated or implied.

EPH 5:25 – 27 Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself up for her; that He might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, that He might present to Himself the church in all her glory, having no spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that she should be holy and blameless.

Two spiritual responsibilities to which God holds all husbands:

What boundaries would these responsibilities place on his ministry involvement?

EPH 5:28 – 30 So husbands ought also to love their own wives as their own bodies. He who loves his own wife loves himself; for no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ also does the church, because we are members of His body.

Wives:

Similarly as helpmate in your husbands ministry, certain boundaries must naturally be in place. God holds all wives first responsible in their relationship to their husband and the marriage and only then is she free to minister outside this primary responsibility. Read the following passages. 1TI 2:12 But I do not allow a woman to teach or exercise authority over a man, but to remain quiet.

And this I say for your own benefit; not to put a restraint upon you, but to promote what is seemly, and to secure undistracted devotion to the Lord.

How does I Corinthians 7:34 – 35 speak to the importance of ministry boundaries in marriage?

Titus 2:3-5 Older women likewise are to be reverent in their behavior, not malicious gossips, nor enslaved to much wine, teaching what is good, that they may encourage the young women to love their husbands, to love their children, to be sensible, pure, workers at home, kind, being subject to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be dishonored.

What are the older women to teach the younger women in Titus 2:3 – 5

How does it necessitate boundaries in their home vs. ministry responsibilities. In other words how would it affect their ability to teach these things if their own marriages and homes were neglected for the sake of the ministry?

As you consider both Priscilla's ministry and these passages on boundaries, how is the Biblical model of the wife and the ministry different from so many models you see presented in the 21 century Christian community?

According to the Biblical models would a godly wife be an evangelist, pastor or ministry leader apart and separate from her role as helpmate to her husband?

Chapter Four

A Couples Mutual Vows

A husband's and wife's covenant needs, are created by God, they are lasting and legitimate needs, for which they have no morale outlet outside of marriage.

Introduction: Christ the Center of every marriage

In the Marriage Covenant there are certain mutual vows, which the couple brings with them and which now, upon becoming one, they join in, in their new relationship with God as the two have become one. These vows are in the area of the Lordship of Jesus Christ and personal discipleship and shared involvement in the ministry.

Of course there is always the very real danger that a couple comes into marriage pretty much pursuing their own agenda in life and assume that this will continue. Nothing could be further from the truth. When you stand before God and make your vows of the covenant of marriage, you join as Christians, vowing to form a Christian union, to have a Christ Centered marriage, home and family.

The key of course is Christ as the center of the marriage. Galatians 2:20 states, *"I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me, and delivered Himself up for me."* A Christian's marriage should be radically different from that of the world around them. With such tremendous social forces pulling us into conformity to the world, it is only by the power of Christ that we will be able to resist. It must be "no longer I who live but Christ who lives in me", this is the only way we will be able to live out the true Christian marriage before the world. This is possible because we are no longer the same, we are new and unique creatures in Christ. II Corinthians 5:17 teaches this clearly, *"Therefore if any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come."* Yet still this is not enough, we must have a model with which to direct this new found life. II Timothy 3:16 & 17 states, *"All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work."* The Word of God must be the final authority in all issues dealing with marriage. Not culture, not what seems right, not what feels right, not what the prevailing winds of scientific thought proclaim but rather solely the authority of the Word of God. With Christ as the power source of our life, with ourselves as born again, regenerated, new creatures, with the Word of God as our guide, we will be able to present to the world the true model of the Christ centered marriage, the Christ centered family, the marriage covenant as manifested in the disciplemaking family.

I. The Word of God

- A. The husband as spiritual head of the marriage.
 1. As the spiritual leader of his the husband must by necessity be a man of the Word.
 2. I Corinthians 14: 34 & 35 states, *"Let the women keep silent in the churches; for they are not permitted to speak, but let them subject themselves, just as the Law also says. And if they desire to learn anything, let them ask their own husbands at home; for it is improper for a woman to speak in church."*
 3. If the wife is to rely upon her husband that assumes that the husband is devoting himself to the Word that he might master it.

4. It is to the shame of many a husband that his wife must go to others for her spiritual questions, rather than her husband.
 5. It is assumed then that the husband will bring with him to the marriage a strong commitment to the Word of God.
- B. The husband as the spiritual instructor of the children
1. Not only is the husband the spiritual leader of his wife, but he is as well the spiritual teacher and leader of his children.
 2. Ephesians 6:4 commands the father to bring the children up, *“in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.”*
 3. Again, if the children are to rely upon their father for spiritual instruction, it presupposes that the father is a man of the Word.
 4. It is the shame of many a father that their children must go to Sunday School for their spiritual instruction rather than to their father.
 5. It is assumed then that the husband will continue his commitment to the Word of God that he might fulfill his role as spiritual leader in the home.
- C. The husband as spiritual leader in the community.
1. Every husband wants the wife described in Proverbs 31, but what most men don't realize that the husband she marries is also revealed in the chapter. One telling attribute can be found in Proverbs 31:23; *“Her husband is known in the gates as he sits among the elders of the land.”* The husband of the “excellent wife” of Proverbs 31 is a man of wisdom and stature in the Word of God. He is a spiritual leader who sits with the Elders.
 2. Ezra was such a man. The Word of God says of him in Ezra 7:10, *“For Ezra had set his heart to study the law of the Lord, and to practice it, and to teach His statutes and ordinances in Israel.”*
 3. It is assumed therefore that the husband will bring into the marriage a commitment to the Word of God, a commitment to the spiritual leadership of the home and community based on a mastery of the Word of God.
- D. The husband then commits to bring to the marriage a commitment to the Word of God, that he might fulfill his role as spiritual leader of his wife, the children, the home and the community at large.
- E. The wife and her commitment to the Word of God
1. Not only does the father take initiative in the spiritual instruction of the children, but the mother does so as well. Proverbs 1:8 states, *“Hear, my son, your father's instruction, And do not forsake your mother's teaching;”* and again in Proverbs 6:29, *“My son, observe the commandment of your father, And do not forsake the teaching of your mother;”* It is assumed then that the wife will bring with her to the marriage a strong commitment to the Word of God. That this will result in dynamic discussions with her husband and in the spiritual development of her children. Paul said of Timothy, in II Timothy 1:5, *“For I am mindful of the sincere faith within you, which first dwelt in your grandmother Lois, and your mother Eunice, and I am sure that it is in you as well.”* The spiritual influence of a godly grandmother and mother paid rich dividends in Timothy's life and so should the spiritual commitment of all wives and mothers richly reward the home in which they dwell.

2. In addition to this the commitment of the wife to the Word of God provides a safeguard for her husband. God tells Abraham in Genesis 21:12, “...*whatever Sarah tells you, listen to her, for through Isaac your descendants shall be named.*” A mature Christian husband will discuss all things with his wife, will seek her counsel, it is only through a strong commitment to the Word of God that a Christian wife can fulfill this role
3. Finally in Titus 2:4 & 5 the Holy Spirit admonishes the older women to be teachers, “*that they may encourage the young women to love their husbands, to love their children,*” and this presupposes a lifetime commitment to the Word of God in preparation for this important ministry.
4. It is assumed then that the wife brings with her to the marriage a commitment to God’s Word, that she may interact with and advise her husband, that she might teach her children and that she might disciple and teach the younger women around her.

II. Prayer

A. Mutual commitment

1. The Bible says of Job, in Job1:5 “*And it came about, when the days of feasting had completed their cycle, that Job would send and consecrate them, rising up early in the morning and offering burnt offerings according to the number of them all; for Job said, "Perhaps my sons have sinned and cursed God in their hearts." Thus Job did continually.*”
2. The Bible says of Hannah in I Samuel 1:11, “*And she made a vow and said, "O Lord of hosts, if Thou wilt indeed look on the affliction of Thy maidservant and remember me, and not forget Thy maidservant, but wilt give Thy maidservant a son, then I will give him to the Lord all the days of his life, and a razor shall never come on his head."* When God honored Hannah’s prayer her response is revealed in verses 27 & 28; “*For this boy I prayed, and the Lord has given me my petition which I asked of Him. So I have also dedicated him to the Lord; as long as he lives he is dedicated to the Lord.*” *And he worshipped the Lord there.*
3. In both cases, Job and Hannah brought into their marriages a strong commitment to prayer. God expects both the husband and the wife to bring to their union and equal commitment to prayer

- B. A strong commitment to prayer, begun in the early ears of the marriage, then transcends into the family as children are added. Family devotionals become the norm and a strong family knitted together by prayer grows through the years.

III. Fellowship

A. Commitment to the Body of Christ

1. An interesting series of verses occurs in the New Testament
 - a. Acts 8:3 *But Saul began ravaging the church, entering house after house; and dragging off men and women, he would put them in prison.*
 - b. Romans 16:5 *also greet the church that is in their house. Greet Epaenetus, my beloved, who is the first convert to Christ from Asia.*
 - c. 1Corinthians 16:19 *The churches of Asia greet you. Aquila and Prisca greet you heartily in the Lord, with the church that is in their house.*

- d. Collisions 4:15 *Greet the brethren who are in Laodicea and also Nympha and the church that is in her house.*
 - e. Philemon 1:2 *and to Apphia our sister, and to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house:*
2. In each passage the Church is associated with the House, when Paul persecuted the Church, it was by entering the house, throughout Rome, Collisia and the early Christian world, churches met in homes.
 3. Couples then should bring to the marriage a strong commitment to the Church, to the growth of the Body of Christ. This is joined as the two become one and their homes become centers of the ministry of the Church.
- B. The Achilles heal of most marriages is the friends the young couple chooses to keep. Many a naïve young couple has sought out friends of mutual secular interest, rather than spiritual interests. The world teaches that good will triumph over evil. In terms of friendships nothing could be further from the truth. The Word of God teaches us in I Corinthians 15:33 *“Do not be deceived: “Bad company corrupts good morals.” It is important that the couple bring this conviction with them to their marriage.*
1. I have seen first hand the tragedy when a young husband develops less than wholesome friendships through a sport, work or outside interest. Thinking that he will not be affected, his morals are instead corrupted.
 2. I have seen first hand the tragedy when a young wife, needing girlfriends, develops less than wholesome friendship through a sport, work or social outlet. Thinking that she will not be affected, her morals are instead corrupted.
 3. The passage has two aspects to it...
 - a. First, *“Do not be deceived”* - satan is the deceiver. He would like you to think that you are the exception, that the influence is not so great, that you can handle it, that you tried it, and see, nothing bad happened. If you are thinking along these lines, God only has one thing to say to you, it is your responsibility to believe Him in this area and not be deceived.
 - b. Second, *“Bad company corrupts good morals”* - in the area of relaxed friendships, bad overcomes good, this is a spiritual law, it is revealed to us by God, we cannot change it, we must accept it and act accordingly.
 4. It is important that a husband and wife bring into their marriage good strong Christian friendships and that these be maintained as a couple.

IV. Ministry

- A. In the New Testament the home is not only the center for Christian fellowship, it is the center of ministry as well.
1. When Paul wanted to attack the ministry of the church, he attacked the home, the family, Acts 8:3 *But Saul began ravaging the church, entering house after house, and dragging off men and women, he would put them in prison.*
 2. Timothy was brought up and nurtured as a young Christian, in the home, by his mother and grandmother, II Timothy 1:5 *For I am mindful of the sincere faith within you, which first dwelt in your grandmother Lois, and your mother Eunice, and I am sure that it is in you as well.*
 3. Priscilla and Aquilla had an active ministry as a couple.

- a. They sponsored church and ministry activities in their home, I Corinthians 16:19 *“The churches of Asia greet you. Aquila and Prisca greet you heartily in the Lord, with the church that is in their house.”*
 - b. As a couple, they went with Paul on a mission trip, Acts 18:18 *“And Paul, having remained many days longer, took leave of the brethren and put out to sea for Syria, and with him were Priscilla and Aquila. In Cenchrea he had his hair cut, for he was keeping a vow.”*
 - c. As a couple, they mentored and disciples promising young ministers, Acts 18:26 *“and he (Appollos) began to speak out boldly in the synagogue. But when Priscilla and Aquila heard him, they took him aside and explained to him the way of God more accurately.”*
- B. Matthew 28:19 & 20 states, *“Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.”* Each individual is responsible for this verse before God, but in the covenant of marriage, it is expected that when the two become one there will be a melding of gifts and callings, bringing the two together into an exciting ministry future which God has planned for them. That their home will be a center for ministry activities, that as a couple they will be available to serve the Lord on long or short term mission trips and that they will use their home to nurture young men and women in the faith leading youth, college, singles, young couples studies that the next generation of Christian laborers might be assured.

V. Reflection:

- A. If you decide that you are not individually responsible for any of the covenants mentioned. Who do you want to step in and do it in your place?
- B. Who do you want to model these responsibilities for your spouse? Who do you want to step in to fill the void which your negligence has created?
- C. If you are unwilling to respond responsibly to your vows, to the covenant you have made with God, who do you want to take your place?

VI. Conclusion

In the Marriage Covenant there are certain mutual vows, which the couple brings with them and which now, upon becoming one, they join in, in their new relationship with God as the two have become one. These vows are in the area of the Lordship of Jesus Christ and personal discipleship and shared involvement in the ministry.

POST STUDY PROJECTS CHAPTER Four

Remember: You do not have to do what I do but you have to do something. In terms of your application of Scripture, you do not have to do it my way. My applications are in no way inspired by God, they are simply given to you as a service. Perhaps you will find them helpful, perhaps they will stimulate your thinking as creative ideas and you will use them as a stepping stone to your own creative applications. You do however have to do something. If you respond, “Rev. Mahon, that is your way, it reflects your age, gifts and calling, that is just not me.” That is perfectly OK, I have no problem with that, as long as I when I ask you, “Fine, what is ‘your way’?” that you do not respond, “nothing”. You do not have to do what I do but you have to do something, “nothing” is not an acceptable answer, the Word of God demands an application. For instance. Note the husband's inventory is titled "My walk with God as the husband and spiritual leader of the home". The husband would read the first passage as it applies to the Word of God in his life. He would do the inventory and personal evaluation though in terms of the Word of God in his life as it applies to his walk with God as the husband and spiritual leader of the home. Not simply his personal devotional time or personal commitment to the Word of God but rather as he applies the Word of God directly to his role as husband and spiritual leader in the home.

Likewise the wife's inventory is titled "My walk with God as the wife and spiritual helpmate in the home". When she does her inventory and personal evaluation, she will first read the passage and then do her evaluation, not in terms of her generic commitment to the Word of God and personal devotional life but specifically the position the Word of God plays in her active role and ministry as wife and spiritual helpmate in the home.

Lastly, you will both sit down together, share your thoughts as they apply to your own walk with God in the context of marriage and home and then discuss together how you as a couple can grow in each of these areas.

Remember, you are not evaluating your spouse, you are not evaluating yourself in a general or generic sense, you are taking a personal inventory specifically as to how you are doing in these areas in terms of your Biblical role in marriage and the home.
