Chapter 12

Basic Rules of Interpreting the Bible

- I. Rule of Language** - The meanings of words in the Bible cannot be avoided or changed to fit our biases, we must come to terms with the meaning of the terms employed by the Holy Spirit.
- A. God chose to use language without explanation.
 - B. Language without meaning is simply nonsensical phonics.
 - C. As a result, language is not subject to feeling.
 - D. Language may create or cause feelings but feelings cannot effect the meaning of a word.
- DEU 5:24 "And you said, 'Behold, the Lord our God has shown us His glory and His greatness, and we have heard His voice from the midst of the fire; we have seen today that God speaks with man, yet he lives.
- JOB 33:14 "Indeed God speaks once, Or twice, yet no one notices it.

GEN 1:3 Then **God said**, "Let there be light"; and there was light. – 46 x's

GEN 4:6 Then the **Lord said** to Cain, "Why are you angry? And why has your countenance fallen? – 232 x's

GEN 8:15 Then **God spoke** to Noah, saying, - 12 x's

- II. Rule of First Meaning** - The obvious meaning rather than inferred or symbolic meanings are always embraced unless the passage is presented as symbol, parable or prophetic.
- A. The number one tool of Biblical interpretation is the dictionary.
 - 1. Advancements in Biblical scholarship and translation have made a working knowledge of Greek nice but not absolutely necessary in teaching a Bible study.
 - 2. Few laymen will ever master Greek and Hebrew to the point where they are taken to a level higher than that of existing translations and Bible Language study aids.
 - 3. As a result a good translation coupled with a few excellent Language tools is more than adequate for the lay Bible study leader.

- B. As you reflect on these Bible study tools, can you say that you have been studying the Bible or simply finding verses on subject upon which you wish to teach? There is an important difference between the two and both the teacher and the student should early learn to recognize between them.
- C. Submitting our convictions to the Word of God is very important. It is not what we think God has said that is important, but rather what God has said. It is not what we feel God should say that is important, but rather what God has said.
- D. Romans 1:16 speaks of “not being ashamed of the Gospel”. Most interpret this as not being ashamed to speak of Christ but it can also mean not being ashamed of the content of God’s Word. It is important that when God speaks to an area and we are uncomfortable that we immediately repent of our embarrassment on behalf of God. God does not need to be covered for, the Word of God does not need to be cleaned up.
- E. There are many sections of the Bible of which Christians are ashamed – The seven day creation; the New Testament teachings on slavery; the New Testament teachings on a woman’s role in the church and home; passages on beating of children; passages on beating of slaves; many of the audacious miracles (the sun standing still for example). It is important that we establish early in our Bible study, that if we are embarrassed by the content of God’s Word it is a reflection on us and no on God.

F. Note to teacher: Do the following study from the Workbook and make sure you have conquered your embarrassment of the Bible before continuing on.

III. Rule of Clear vs. Obscure - We do not abandon the clear for the obscure. We sometime are left to tell what the verse does not mean on the basis of the clear, without ever fully understanding what it does mean.
