## Extra Biblical Revelation

**Definition: Any form of knowledge or experience which gives us information concerning God, His Work or His Will, which is not directly quoted in scripture.**

*PRO 30:5 Every word of God is tested; He is a shield to those who take refuge in Him.*

## II. Extra Biblical Revelation

You are lying in bed sound asleep and slowly you become aware of a humming sound, so deep that it seems to vibrate your whole body. You are aware that the whole room seems to be full of the sound and as you look up the door to your room seems to be about to explode with light. From all four seams of the door, light shafts of a brilliant nature penetrate your room, and as you struggle to adjust your vision the door flies from it's hinges and the room fills with an acrid smoke (Ezekiel 28:14 & 16). Before you stands a tremendous angelic being, clothed in light of brilliance (Isaiah 14:12; Ezekiel 28:13; II Corinthians 11:14) and in his right hand a flaming sword. You try to stand but as you do so he speaks and his words (Revelation 13:11) roll over you like the waves of the sea, suffocating you, your limbs become like jelly and you collapse to the ground, unable to move (Mark 9:18 & 25). When he speaks it is as if your head will explode and the words thunder and roll over you like the waves of the sea. "I am Gabriel and captain of the armies of God and I stand in the presence of the Lord (II Corinthians 11:14). You are the chosen one. In the past, men looked to the first coming of the Messiah as a warrior and He came as a child. In this age too, men look for the coming of a warrior and again He will come as a child (Acts 1:11; Hebrews 9:28). You will be the prophet who goes before to prepare the way of the Lord.. Just as I appeared to Joseph the earthly father of Jesus, to Mary, the mother of Jesus, to Zacharias, the father of John the Baptist, I now appear to you." (Galatians 1:8) You cannot believe your ears and as you struggle to speak you demand that the angelic being profess Christ. He cries (Mark 3:11) out in a voice so loud, it is as if the whole house might explode, "There is one God (James 2:19), Jesus is the Holy One of God (Mark 1:23 & 24), Jesus, the Son of God (Mark 3:11), Jesus, Son of the most high God (Mark 5:7)!!!" In addition, he freely quotes the Word of God, expositing passages such as Psalm 91:11 & 12, "For He will give His angels charge concerning you, To guard you in all your ways. They will bear you up in their hands, Lest you strike your foot against a stone" in such a dynamic and forceful way that they seem to come alive to you for the first time (Luke 4:9 - 13). As he proclaims this he trembles at the words he speaks and you can see visibly the fear of God in his eyes (James 2:19). "Could this be?" you wonder. "Could this actually be a messenger from God, Gabriel, captain of the armies of God, could I be the chosen prophet to bring this message to the world?" You gaze into his face and slowly you recognize him. You have seen him a hundred times, he is the angel guarding the child in the Christian book store you frequent. The artist claimed inspiration from God, but now you just begin to realize how inspired he was. (Deuteronomy 4:23) This is the same angel, this must indeed be Gabriel. Remembering how Gideon and Zacharias asked for a sign to test their angelic messengers, you too ask for a sign (Matthew 12:39). He gives you first the sign of Elijah, to call down fire from heaven. You marvel as you see, at your command, fire fall upon a shrub, seen clearly from your window, consumed in the flames. (Revelation 13:11 - 13) Then he gives you the sign of Moses, to transform inanimate to animate. Just as Moses commanded the rod to become a snake (Exodus 7:10 & 11), at your words the ceramic bird on the mantle comes to life and flies around your room (Revelation 13:15). Lastly he gives you the sign of Paul, the ability to heal a fatal wound (Revelation 13:12). Yes it must be so, he proclaims Christ (John 8:44), he quotes accurately the Word of God (Luke 4:3, 9 - 11) and now you have the signs of the three greatest men in the Bible, Elijah, Moses and Paul (Mark 8:12). Then just as Zacharias was made dumb for his lack of faith and only given his speech back when he was able to obey the angel so now you are made dumb. Your speech will return, you are told, when you begin your ministry (Matthew 12:22). You listen as the revelation is unfolded (Revelation 22:18 & 19), you yield, he places his hands on your head, your body seems to fill with flames, flames fall upon you, just as you imagined they did at Pentecost, (Ephesians 6:11)

and you are empowered with signs and wonders (II Thessalonians 2:9), “Do not worry” he says, “The words will be given you when you yield totally to your new ministry.” The very next day you begin your ministry. Word of your power, your message and your signs and wonders fill the airwaves and newspapers. Soon the whole world is following your exploits (Revelation 12:9; 20:3 & 8). Many pastors and Christian leaders oppose you but you know what you are to do. At the appointed time you call for them to answer your challenge, altars are built. Many refuse to come, but this just adds fuel to the fire of your ridicule. For those who do appear, they find the altars prepared in the center of a giant stadium. Ringside seats are available for the media of the world, which watches with baited breath as these ministers and pastors respond to your challenge to call for fire to come down from heaven, yet nothing happens. You laugh and deride them as Elijah did, then, on your command, even as on Elijah’s, fire falls from heaven and consumes the sacrifice (Revelation 13:13). Through the modern marvels of satellite, the internet and cable, the world witnesses this demonstration and flocks to your ministry. You are indeed the prophet of God. (Revelation 13:14) As you grow in your yieldedness you grow in your spiritual power. Prophetic utterances, future events, (Deuteronomy 18:10; Ezekiel 21:23; Acts 16:16) healings (Revelation 13:3 & 12) , signs and wonders all follow (II Thessalonians 2:9; Revelation 13:14; 16:14; 19:20). You are able to speak as you never spoke before and people listen (II Timothy 4:3 & 4). You do not understand all that you are saying. Sometimes in your prophetic utterances you are completely given up to the control of the spirit, it takes over as you speak of great and mighty spiritual truths, predicting accurately with the spirit of prophecy as it controls your speech (I Corinthians 14:32). You are not sure where the words come from or their implications (Revelation 2:24; Deuteronomy 29:29). You are being carried along by the ministry and the gifts given to you. You only know that to doubt is to lose your position. You must not doubt, you must not question, you must obey (Acts 17:11). As a glove is filled by the hand and unquestionably does the will of the hand, so you seek to let go and let God use you completely in this new ministry. You are dead to self, your self-control is now given up, cast aside completely, that you might be totally yielded to the spirit’s control (Acts 24:25; Galatians 5:23; II Timothy 3:3; II Peter 1:6). Skeptics melt away like ice before the heat of your words as they must choose between the faith that results in the healing of their loved ones or doubt which returns them to their pain and suffering (Job 2:7). Those who follow you are blessed beyond belief (Luke 4: 5 & 6) , those who oppose you are judged, some with poverty, some with calamity, some with sickness, some with death (Job 1:13 - 19; Revelation 11:7 & 8; 12:11). In your hand is blessing and judgment. All the world acknowledges that not since the days of Moses, of Elijah and of the Apostles has so much good, so many blessings been accomplished by one man and the spiritual force which you command is beyond question (Ephesians 6:12; ). The Lord’s name is constantly on your tongue, you pray in the name of the Lord Jesus publicly, you prophesy in the name of Jesus, you cast out demons in the name of Jesus, (did not Jesus Himself say “a house divided against itself cannot stand!”), how can you not be a prophet of God if you are casting out demons?), you perform miracles in the name of Jesus, how can anyone doubt that you are His prophet and that your words are indeed the Words of God (Matthew 7:21 – 23). You are the one and great prophet and the whole world flocks to your message (Revelation 13:14).
