

# Dear Prayer Warriors,



GCI Team Dan McCollum and Rich and Kathy Smith have arrived. They brought 5 boxes of Bibles and reference materials and immediately went to work teaching the Word of God and giving their testimonies. The second picture is them leaving to minister. They are teaching this week at the Navigator Training Center in Yaoundé and then depart with us Wednesday for Bamenda, where they will be teaching at a four-day national leadership conference attended by pastors, ministers, lay ministers, Bible teachers and leaders in the Navigator's University Student Ministry.



Eleanor and I have been hard at work teaching and preaching the holy, eternal, inerrant written Word of God. I have given over 35 messages in various venues this past week, with Eleanor assisting me in logistics, as well as meeting with the women to teach and instruct.



One of the highpoints of the week was being asked to be involved with the ordination of Taniform Peters to the Ministry of the Gospel. Pastor Rene Nsom was in charge of the service.



It was a privilege to give the ordination message and the charge to the Peters before his ordination. This message will appear next month on our website for those who are interested.



Board members Dan McCollum and Rich Smith also spoke.



The following Sunday, I was privileged to minster with now Rev. Taniform Peters. I have known Peters since he was a university student, when we would sit up late into the night as he asked Bible question after Bible question after student meetings at the Navigator Center in Yaoundé, Cameroon.



Dan and Rich both gave their testimonies at church. Each did this from memory, quoting 10 to 15 verses each. All GCI Mission Team members are able to share their 5-minute testimony from memory and of the 40 verses they memorize, 15 have to do with witnessing and the personal testimony. It is a privilege to minister with men who model the exhortation of God the Holy Spirit in 1 Corinthians 16:13 "Be on the alert, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong."



Afterwards we took time to take a picture to celebrate Peters' first service as an ordained minister.



That night I spoke twice in the Sunday evening service. As those who have ministered with me know, we come to the mission field to work. I tell the host we want to work on the "Sucked Orange Principle." When we leave, we want to look like sucked oranges. We come full and leave empty. We come with excess baggage and leave well below our limit. We come to serve and not to be missionary tourists. We come bearing in mind the exhortation of our risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ - John 9:4 "We must work the works of Him who sent Me as long as it is day; night is coming when no one can work."

I close this email, as always, with a deep and abiding thankfulness for your sacrificial and effectual prayers, which empower and drive this ministry ever forward in the cause of Christ.

Words: Thomas O. Chisholm, 1917. Music: Lowden, Carl H. Lowden, 1915 (MIDI, score). Lowden originally wrote the music—to different words—for a Children's Day service. Two years later, he came across the music in his files, and asked Chisholm if he could write lyrics for it. The result has been translated into more than 15 languages. Chisholm was educated in a small country school, and became its teacher at age 16. At age 21, he became associate editor of the weekly newspaper, The Franklin Favorite. In 1893, he became a Christian under the ministry of Dr. Henry Clay Morrison (future president of Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky). Chisholm moved to Louisville at the persuasion of Morrison and became editor of the *Pentecostal Herald*. He was ordained a Methodist minister in 1903 and served a brief pastorate at Scottsville, Kentucky. In poor health, he moved his family to a farm near Winona Lake, Indiana. He became an insurance salesman, moving to Vineland, New Jersey, in 1916. He retired in 1953 to the Methodist Home for the Aged in Ocean Grove, New Jersey. Chisholm wrote over 1200 poems, of which 800 were published, and many set to music. Another which you may find familiar to this day is Great Is Thy Faithfulness. As for the composer of the tune, Lowden came from a musical family—his father is said to have played the trumpet while rocking Carl's cradle, and his mother played the organ. By age 12, Carl was selling compositions to Hall-Mack Company, and conducting the church orchestra by the time he was a teenager. Lowden was associated both with

the Hall-Mack Company and with music publisher John J. Hood. In 1913, he became music editor for the Reformed Church in America. He later went into business for himself (though he failed during the Great Depression of the 1930s). He then taught at the Bible Institute of Pennsylvania, and was the minister of music at the Linden Baptist Church in Camden, New Jersey.
